## Sea Sports




To nearly every Lago Hi Student, the most popular of all sports are by far those affiliated with the sea.

The T-Docks at Roger's Beach is probably one of the busiest spots in the colony on any Saturday or Sunday afternoon. The firstarrivals on the scene are just the common swimmers and dock loiterers, who begin to filter out across the sand shortly after one o'clock, just after their lunches have had time to settle. They spread themselves out on towels and settle down to soak as much sunshine as possible in an attemptto get that healthy, rudycomplexion so typical of Aruba.

They carry their motor down the stairs, put it onto a fast boat, and proceed to roar up and down the lagoon at breakneck speed. A few of the slower motorboats are out by now, and the skiers bear down on them contemptuously, dousing them with water.

Then more activity begins on the beach. The sailfish are being broughtout. They are carried into the water, the sails are hoisted, and they set out into the lagoon, deftly dodging rafts, water-skiers and the few stray swimmers who have been unable to escape from the water by this time. Occasionally, one of the sailfish gets caught at the wrong angle by a gust of wind and capsizes, bringing jeering laughter from the crowd on shore; but it is soon righted again and put under way.

Meanwhile, there is a constant hum of activity on the beach as the more ambitious of the sunseekers go down the slide, push each other off the docks, dive from "top tower," or just wade around. There is a constant traffic of clotheswearing landlubbers back and forth between the docks and the Esso Club, and occasionally one of them will be dragged onto the docks and pushed off, which adds greatly to the excitement and general tumult.

As the sun goes lower into the sky, things begin to quiet down. The sailfish skippers have gotten a chill and return to the dock. The waterskiers begin to tire and come limping up to the yacht club to rest. Soon, the spearfishermen return and begin to clean their fish, throwing fish scales and entrails into the water around the dock. This brings the few remaining swimmers out of the water, and everybodypicks up his towel and sets out for home.

All in all, it is hard to imagine any more enjoyable way of spending an afternoon--anywhere.

"Are you going to the Canteen Dance Saturday night?" That phrase, or one similar to it, has been repeated countless times by the students of Lago High.

Since the founding of the Canteen or ganization in November of 1948, it has grown in popularity until at the present time the activities that it sponsors are relied upon and looked forward to by all of its large membership.

The idea of having an organization such as the Youth Canteen can be attributed to Mr . Cliff Monroe and to the Senior class of 1949. They presented their ideas before the Lago Community Council, Lago Community Church, Lago Community School, Parents Association and Sunday School. The groups agreed to unite in setting such an organization on its feet with the Parent Association acting as sponsors.

To begin with, the senior class became the executive branch of the group, and two members were chosen from each of the other classes to form the council. However, this plan altered somewhat in 1950 when five members of the Junior class took over the executive offices. They are Kenneth Work, president; Penny Richey, secretary; Barbara Hellwig, treasurer; Robert Drew, publicity agent; and James Baggaley.

The Canteen has been very active socially during the pastyear; and because of this, its functions have become practically the sole means of entertainment for Lago High's students. The next social event sponsored by the Canteen was a Come-As-You-Are dance held at the tennis court.

Aruba is a veritable Melting Pot of races. The Spaniards came to plunder and exploit the mineral reserves, and to perpetuate Catholicism. The Dutch came for purely commercial reasons. The English and French peoples wanted better economic conditions, or more political and religious freedom. Many Indians came to improve their standard of living. Negroes arrived by means of the slave trade. Thus the "Aruban" language, Papiamento, is a mixture of Spanish, French, Portuguese, Dutch, African, Indian dialects, and English.

The industries of Aruba have changed with time. The earliest occupations were beading and hat making, and the manufacture of alpargatas. The latter is the only of these which exists today as a trade. The others were abandoned with the introduction of the oil industry and a definite wage scale. Cabinet-making of divi-divi wood was another art to fade into oblivion. Gold mining and phosphate mining were carried on, but proved too unprofitable because of the difficulty of extracting the ores. Only one of the aforementioned industries remains in fullaloe culture. Approximately $78 \%$ of the world's supply of cathartic bases originates in Aruba. This plant was not native to the island; it was brought by the Dutch Colonists from the island of Socotora off the West African coast.

When the first barrel of oil was refined here in 1921, Aruba's modernhistory began. The oil industry brought with it a definite wage scale and consequently a much higher standard of living. Aruba's population has increased to 52,000 and is still progressing. Who can say what the future will bring?
