
Track

Sea Sports


Sea Sports is one activity in which all students take part. Some of the main ones are: swimming, spearfishing, sailfishing, and boating.



Boating has been an activity for a long time in Aruba, and recently skiing and tabletopping were introduced to make it even more enjoyable.


Last, but not least, we have the ever-popular swimming—a sport enjoyed by all.




Girls' P. T.




