




Carole Ross Bond


Lois Sue Bowen




Flying Batons

The cast did a marvelous job (I liked it so well I



Of the four teams that fought it out in the playoffs in February, the Fireballs, headed by Kyle Spitzer, came out on top.


Here's one sport that I'm going to tackle in earnest as soon as Spitzer, Tucker, and Engle relinquish the spotlight.

Mary Wilson bowled the high game of the season, a 213, and Inez Koster had the high average, 162.



must bowl with the other seventh graders. We bowled every Tuesday afternoon. The boys and girls bowled on the same afternoon, but they had separate teams.



No Hands


Being fresh from the States and more interested in football, I didn't even try out for the soccer team, but here is everything you'll want to know about it:


