To the Student Body:


Once again, congratulations are due the yearbook staff of 1960 for an engaging account of current student and faculty endeavor.

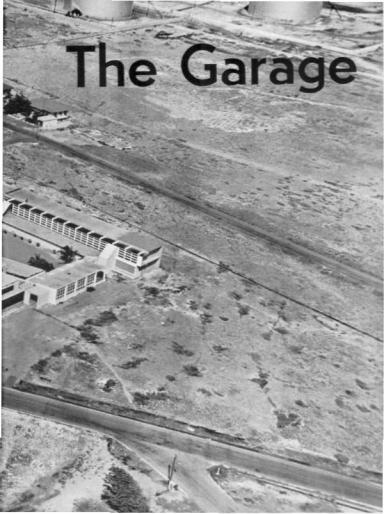

"Come on, you guys!" Class President Steve runs class meetings with authority developed through practice.

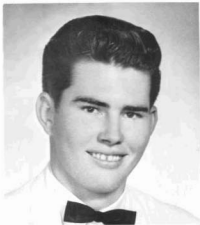

Okay is her password and she's "okay" with us!

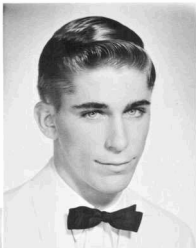

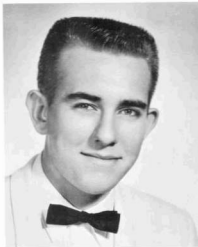
Tall, blonde Pat first set eyes on Aruba in 1959, when she arrived here from her former home in Phillips, Texas.

Red plans to be a history teacher and librarian, although she's not sure where she'll get her degree—probably in New York.

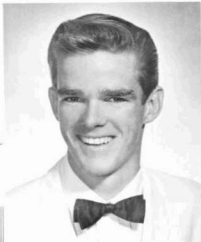
